How close is your airspeed? If you have made modifications let talk them over. I welcome the chance to talk to some other pilot that may be testing your aircraft. I don't have all of the answers but I just might be able to offer something that could make your first flight a safer one. Again, please don't hesitate to call me.

It seems testing is much on my mind of late. I expect to start flight tests on the GP-4 in November!

I will try to keep you posted via our newsletter on some mods we hope to make on Ken Snow's Osprey. The mods are designed to improve performance. They may or may not work, however, Ken is willing to give them a try if I do the design work. Ken is a very busy Pam Am Captain and doesn't have much time so the results may be a bit slow in coming.
